Our communit

MICA helps people who are experiencing poverty meet their needs, build on their strengths, and achieve their goals.

According to the U.S. Census American Community Survey, nearly one in eight children under the age of five in MICA's five-county core service area live in low-income households. Research has shown that these children are more likely to start their education at a development level behind that of their peers - a gap that tends to grow throughout a child's education.

MICA offers Head Start (HS), for children 3-5 years old, and Early Head Start (EHS), for pregnant enrollees and children 0-3 years old. These programs combine age-appropriate learning, social interaction, health screenings, nutrition education, strong family engagement and assistance services to provide children with a rich learning environment.


Our Impact

At MICA, we measure our impact in the number of lives we change.

In 2024, MICA's Early Childhood Programs served 316 children and families (207 in HS, 109 in EHS). Not only did hundreds of children receive a quality early childhood education, but their adult family members also received information and assistance, creating a strong and stable family environment.

Several HS classrooms operated on a program year with a summer break. Therefore, it is normal for HS enrollment to fall below capacity during the summer months. This year, MICA completed a Full Enrollment Plan with the Office of Head Start. Staff actively recruited for this program and we are currently fully enrolled.





A Strong Start

With support and planned at-home activities from their Head Start teacher, a Head Start family shared they have increased conversations, reading books, and connection activities at home with their toddler. When school started, their child spoke 5 words and is now speaking over 45 words and continuing to add more.




A Whole Family Approach


















% of total population enrolled in SNAP
